There will be times when you are invited into the classroom, but at drop off time, please wish your child a good day in the hallway and then approach the door when he/she is ready to enter the classroom independently.

Please remember that when teachers go home, many have families, and it is important for them to have time to devote to their families. Our middle school students made the best of the situation last week and were able to start the school year off-campus on a variety of educational field trips related to our regular curriculum.

We were fortunate enough to learn about our local Deland community's history by touring the Historic Mural Walk through downtown. We viewed more than a dozen murals painted by local artists depicting what life looked like throughout the years.

We then began learning how we are currently effecting our local environment through field trips to the UF Agricultural Extension, the Volusia County Transfer Station and the Marine Science Center in Ponce Inlet. Students learned how we can positively take care of our gardens through the use of purposeful methods that are beneficial for butterflies, saw

the impact of how trash is a problem for our local governments to deal with, and how trash can adversely affect our local marine animals when it ends up in the waterways they call home.

We finished the week visiting our local state park in DeLeon Springs, learning about the history of the park, and enjoying swimming and fishing together before heading home for the weekend.

What's Growing in the Garden?

In Florida, August is the beginning of the gardening year. Coming back to school at this time perfectly coincides with our regional growing cycle. This is the time when we are laying the ground work for the garden to be able to provide fruits and vegetables for our school community. It's time to dig the beds, start seeds and get things ready to grow vegetables and flowers as the heat subsides. The primary garden is a busy place as we head into September!

This year, due to funds we raised from last year's plant sale, we were able to purchase soil and plants before school started. With the success of our plant sale, we hit the ground running! Onward and upward!

So far, the students have helped to weed the butterfly garden, plant new flowers, and dig composted cow manure and top soil into our planting beds. They have helped to plant a tomato and a few pepper plants. We planted carrot seeds and mustard green seeds just this week. We are busy gathering supplies to start taking cuttings and propagating plants. Once the weather cools off slightly we will plant lettuce and snap pea seeds and transplant in some more tomatoes, peppers and flowers that have started from seed at Ms. Jessica's house. Make your own, grow your own!

I am often asked at the beginning of the year if there is anything the garden needs, and the answer is, yes! The number one thing we need is soil. We are always accepting donations of bags of Black Kow composted cow

manure. Not only do we add this to the beds to recharge them before planting, but throughout the year, whenever we plant, we add a little Black Kow to help the new plants establish. Black Kow can be purchased at Lowes for around \$5.00. Bags of topsoil, garden soil and potting soil are also needed, but please no Miracle Grow products (not good due to the added chemical fertilizers). Sta-Green products are slightly less expensive and available at Lowes. And as we come into fall, Lowes and other garden centers should be stocking cool weather crops like lettuce, chard, kale, broccoli, etc. These are always welcome in our garden. There is always room for flowers and herbs, too!

Have you met our new chickens yet? Ms. Sharon raised them from chicks at her home this summer, and recently introduced the to

our brood. Welcome Betty and Bella!

From the Reading Nook

Ms. Blessing worked last year as the Orton-Gillingham Reading Specialist in the school. This year, we have a parent (who is also a former Children's House staff member and public school teacher), Alicia Winchell, who will be working alongside Ms. Blessing. Ms. Alicia is starting the Orton-Gillingham training so they will both use the same approach. Each month, they will offer book selections as well as tips for supporting your child's literacy learning and love of reading.

Welcome back to another school year! During the summer our routines and procedures can become laid back or even non-existent. Our children love spending time with us and as such this natural reward can be offered to make the 'get ready for school' and 'get ready for bed' routines smoother. If your child struggles to get ready, offer to stay with them during this time and talk about what reading topic interests them. You can look through the online or in person public library catalog to find books that will interest your child(ren). You can use these get ready times to read aloud to them and discuss the reading. As the routines get smoother you can encourage your child(ren) that when finished you can have the read alongside time as well. We recommend aiming for 15-20 minutes of daily read aloud time to your child(ren) and 15-20 minutes of daily read alongside time with your child(ren). After reading to your child(ren) discuss what was read; the characters, setting and events of the story. After reading alongside your child(ren) discuss what was read and how reading is a lifelong habit that we all wish to instill. This reading time will come to be expected by your child(ren) and will give you time to discuss other interests as well. Try to incorporate this time into your daily routine and I hope you find smoother routines as a result!


