What's Growing in the Garden?

The weather has been swinging wildly lately, plunging down into the low forties and soaring into the 80's all in a 24 hour period! Despite this, the garden has remained a busy, busy place. Early spring cleaning has begun as we rake up the leaves and pull out the weeds and we fill up our new composters. We've planted new tomatoes, received

new potting tables (built by Ms. Sharon's husband Jim) and continued with activities that introduce concepts from biology and taxonomy. We've begun planning for our spring plant sale! It is scheduled for April 21-23, mark your calendars!

We also received a \$100 sponsorship from Lowe's. A big thank you to Katy Clary for helping us obtain this wonderful gift for our garden! We purchased a hose, loppers, weeding tools, and weeding buckets, a blackberry bush and flowers. (pictured right)



The cool weather has meant a lot of delicious treats in the garden. We have harvested peas, greens, peppers, and dill for Friday salad. The loquats have ripened and been enjoyed by everyone passing through the garden. If you haven't had one, stop on by! Pansies, mums, borage, calendula, marigold, African blue basil, various salvias, coreopsis are all brightening even the coldest mornings. We've also got a lot native gaillardia and black-eyed Susan's not yet in bloom springing up all over the butterfly garden. As we approach spring even more color should appear, a feast for the eyes as well as our pollinators.

Montessori Materials

The Pink Tower, The Golden Beads, The Racks and Tubes. When you hear about these things at home, do you wonder what they are and how they relate to your child's education? I sometimes hear parents saying they don't have a clear vision of how their children are learning. Each material has a purpose, and each one is important. Let's begin with the Pink Tower. It's a lesson done with the younger children, and is a foundational material from the sensorial area of the classroom. The task a child faces it to complete the tower from biggest cube to smallest. Stacking the cubes calls for visual discrimination, coordination, and precision. Indirectly, the child is preparing him/herself for understanding cubed roots in later math. It also introduces the concept of base ten, with the smallest cube being 1 cm cubed and the largest being 10 cm cubed.

Upper Elementary with Ms. Esther and Mr. Keegan

This month, Upper Elementary students have been studying peoples and civilizations from the past. They have created

models of tribal homes, handmade hunting tools, and canoes. Some students have created beautiful artwork to represent clothing, religious beliefs, and daily life. The older students took a trip to our local library to check out books about the ancient river valley civilizations. The students are all working hard to create beautiful presentations to share with each other. One of our students, Riley, is especially proud of his work on the Cherokee tribe of North America. Do You Need Help with Juition?

Did you know there are scholarships available? The state of Florida has a variety of scholarships that can help pay tuition at private schools.

- 1. Florida Tax Credit—An income based scholarship
- 2. Family Empowerment Scholarship—An income based scholarship (with a higher income cap)
- 3. The Gardiner Scholarship—For students with certain special needs
- 4. The McKay Scholarship—For children with special needs
- 5. <u>The Hope Scholarship</u>—For children who have been bullied in school (this needs to come from a public school)

If you click on the scholarship names, you'll be directed to the website to learn more about each scholarship, and find out how to apply.

We are also in the process of getting the ELC funding for preschool age children as well as the VPK funding for four year old children. Once that is complete, I'll email all the families it could help.

From the Reading Nook

The following are some games/activities to encourage reading at home: Toddler/Primary – Make a letter match game by cutting out letters from magazines and/or newspapers. Match together the upper- and lower-case letters and practice saying their names and sounds. Primary/ Lower Elementary – Cut out or draw small pictures of familiar objects and match to the beginning consonant letter. Write the letters on a larger piece of paper and say each picture and the letter it begins with. Lower/Upper Elementary – Make a game of concentration with sight words and/or sound out words written on cards. Use Dolch or Fry sight word lists and CVC words for sounding out. Upper Elementary/Middle School – Make a monopoly style game with word family patterns. Write words with similar patterns (night, light, tight) on cards. Line cards in a board style face up. Add additional spaces such as Go Back one space! or Your turn again! Play the game with dice and when you land on a word you record that word on a recording sheet with the pattern. The Middle School students have begun a new type of learning in their classroom. After the teacher change, we enrolled the students in the Florida Virtual School (FLVS) for three of their courses, Math, Social Studies, and English. This was new territory for us as well as the students. It took a little time to get them all enrolled, and for them to get used to this type of learning, but they have really settled into it and are doing quite well. Ms. Patsy is there to guide them when they need it, and they still work together as a group for some of the lessons.

With Ms. Diane, the students are studying oceanography in earth science. They have completed experiments in salinity and are currently doing individual research papers on one of our 5 oceans. We will be studying currents, marine life, and the current state of our oceans in the coming weeks. In art, the students are constructing their own personal sketchbook/journal.

In Life Skills, Ms. Karen has worked with them in different areas. We are so thankful to the two parent volunteers that came and worked with the class. They completed their CPR and First Aid training with Michele Scott of Cardi-Act CPR Training and they had a unit on health and personal hygiene with Dr. Michelle Williams of Central Florida Pediatrics. They are now working on personal finance, including how to write checks and balance their checkbooks.

They have also been busy discussing their graduation trip! They have a lot of ideas, and we're looking at which will be the best option.
