First of all the we would like to thank every one who participated in the "Change for Change" drive. We purchased a hanging birdbath, a beautiful mosaic bird feeder and squirrel baffle, and bird seed. Attracting birds to our garden and observing them is one of our favorite activities! We've already seen a tufted titmouse making use of the new feeder!

In other good news, Ms. Jessica was chosen for a mini-grant by the Volusia County Farm Bureau! She will be using the \$200 to enlarge and improve our little strawberry patch. Watch this space for pictures as we build the new raised bed and plant the new strawberries in spring!

A quick thank you as well to Ms. Deborah for donating a few cabbage plants to our garden. Although the temperature is dropping we are still planting and growing cool weather crops! We have a bunch of newly sprouted sweet peas and snap peas.

We have continued exploring living vs. non-living with the students, as well as doing seed dissecting and looking at the parts of a seed. We've also continued discussing the life cycle of butterflies, and we've released the last of our painted lady butterflies! Also in the garden we've found some monarch and swallowtail caterpillars. We've also started looking at the life cycles of other insects like bees and ladybugs and we've been exploring how different insects share certain characteristics.

So even though we are wearing scarves and hats some mornings we remain busy! If you'd like to contribute to the garden in this cool season, vegetables like leafy greens, broccoli and cabbages can still be planted from starts. Also we are looking for cool weather color for flower arranging!
