## What's Growing in the Garden?

The Primary students have been busy tending to our vegetable garden. Along with weeding and watering, the students planted green bell peppers, onions, and yard long beans. Our tomatoes and herbs are doing well. To add a bit of color to our vegetable garden, some of the students planted sunflower plants.

We continued to observe the tadpoles. They are growing and changing. Five tadpoles turned into adult frogs! The students enjoy adding spinach leaf bits to the habitat to feed the tadpoles.

Some of our bushes and trees required trimming and the students helped with that.

As always, BunBun and the chickens require a lot of care. Students filled the feeders and

made sure they all had water. Bella, our Easter Egger hen, and Betty, our Barred Rock hen are still laying eggs. Our other hens have taken a break from laying to focus on molting and growing new feathers for winter.

Along with caring for our domestic animals, students care for the squirrels and birds. Filling the bird feeders with birdseed and the squirrel feeder with corn is a fun garden activity.

The students also decorated a corn hole game with their handprints for the silent auction.

The Lower Elementary students also had a very busy month in their garden. The students prepared our herb and vegetable gardens for planting. Among the herbs planted were rosemary, dill, parsley, oregano, mint, and sage. Tomatoes and green bell peppers were planted in the vegetable garden. A big thank you to Ms. Dora Mallett for providing us with soil, Black Kow and herbs! We look forward to watching them grow.

Our garden was in need of some trimming, so students trimmed the hedges by the trellis and the banana trees by the school entrance.

Students continued studying the plant life cycle by observing and recording changes in their kidney bean plants. It was a very exciting day when the students were able to take their kidney bean plants home.

Even with so much going on in the garden, students were able to create steppingstones that were donated to the silent auction.




#### Halloween Fun

#### Montessori Education, Mathematics

The Golden Beads are a Montessori math material that you may have heard about at home. There are a variety of concepts that Golden Beads are used for. For example, the child can make a number with the number cards to see how it is written, then use the beads to see what that number looks like in quantity by getting the hundred squares and ten bars.



After they have mastered the first portion, the child will progress through the other concepts attached to this material. They will use it for addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

Introduced in the Primary environment, the Binomial Cube is in the Sensory area of the classroom. It's used to explore cubes, prisms, patters, and structure. In the Elementary environments, the Binomial and Trinomial Cubes are used as a math material. The children learn to deconstruct the cube, first the Binomial, followed by the Trinomial, then put it back together. The blocks are color coded and different sizes to represent algebraic formulas. While this is a math material, the students are really learning concepts to prepare them for math they will be doing later.

The student is shown, through demonstration, to systematically deconstruct, then reconstruct each cube. There is a diagram on the lid that children can use to help them when they first start. However, the cube itself assists because if it is not put together properly, it will not form a perfect cube.
