Meet the School Board Members

Dora Mallett, School Board of Directors, President

In 1984, Dora and her family moved to DeLand and was very pleased to enroll her two children, Joshua and Rebekah, in Children's House, as they had been in a Montessori preschool in Michigan. As a member of the Faith Lutheran congregation she was elected to the Children's House Board. In 1986, she was hired as the Administrative Assistant at Children's House. She shared administrative responsibilities with three Montessori teachers; Mimi Clark, Mary Koenig and Travis Williamson. There were only two Primary classrooms at that time. During the next nine years, the school expanded in size and reputation. We added the Lower Elementary, Upper Elementary and Adolescent programs. In 1995, the first full time administrator, Beverly Williams was hired. The school thrived during these years as community supporters formed the Friends of Montessori who raised funds for the enhancement of the school. Together, under Beverly's leadership, they were able to provide additional costly Montessori equipment for our classrooms, sponsor AMI candidates for training and certification, and funded the development of the Toddler program. Beverly Williams lost a battle with cancer in 2003, but everyone was determined to fulfill her dreams for Children's House. In 2006, Dora was appointed Administrator and with the support of the staff, parents and board, the school continued to strengthen the Montessori programs and secured the its reputation in the community. In 2014, Dora retired as the administrator and recalled the many lovely children, parents and incredible staff and board members with whom she had had the pleasure of working. She continues to see legacy students as second generations enroll, including her two granddaughters followed in their parents' footsteps. Her dedication to the school continues as she serves on the Board of Directors. Founded over 50 years ago, may Children's House Montessori School continue to impact the lives of future generations to come.



Peggy L. Fitzsimmons, School Board of Directors, Vice President

Peggy is a retired Elementary Teacher who worked in the Volusia County Schools. She has lived in DeLand for 44 years, and has been involved with Children's House for 18 of those years. First, her children attended primary through third grade in the 80's, then she became an assistant teacher in the Primary environment and held that position for seven years. She has had five grandchildren who have also attended Children's House, three have moved on and two are still enrolled. Her youngest grandchild is 11 months, and will be starting at Children's House as soon as he is old enough. Her love for the school is strong and that is why she is on the Board of Directors, to help support the school and help it continue to grow and be a vital part of DeLand's community.

Breathe, Move, Relax



It has been a great start to the school year! I would like to introduce myself. My name is Sunny, and I am the Yoga, Meditation and Physical Education instructor. I also substitute in the classroom environments when needed. I have four children from ages 24 to 8, and they have all attended Children's House, with my youngest currently in Ms. Nettie's class.

The Middle School students start each day with meditation. It is a time to ground their energy, quiet their minds, and let go of anything that may be no longer serving them. They are practicing quieting their minds and checking in with their breath and body. It is a beneficial way to start the first 15 minutes of their day. In PE, they have created a list of activities they are interested in trying. So far, we have done kickball, basketball, and volleyball. We have started working on our core muscles three times per week. Our goals are to build our skills in how to be a good team member, clear communication and respect.

Yoga is body awareness, balance, flexibility, coordination, mindfulness, connecting to their breath to facilitate movement, and proper alignment. It helps with relaxation, quieting the mind, and showing respect to ourselves and the class as a whole. During our yoga time, we also discuss anatomy and learn the proper names of the bones. In October, we will study the individual bones in the hands and feet! We also practice poses and use our breath to facilitate the movement. The most important part of our class is the Savasana (pronounced Shavasana), which is a relaxation pose. This is where they practice quieting their minds, relaxing their muscles, and following their breath. This helps soothe the nervous system and brings peace of mind. This gives the children the opportunity to check in with themselves and take a moment to relax.

What's Growing in the Garden?

Hurricane Dorian toppled two of our banana trees. Fortunately, we were able to save the banana bunches and ripen them on our patio. Once ripened, the bananas were shared with the students. They were delicious!

Some of the daily activities in the garden include watering and weeding of our garden beds. Over the past few weeks students have planted radishes, carrots, kale, tatsoi and Swiss chard in the garden as well as thyme, sage and oak leaf lettuce in flats. Miss Jessica started some tomato and pepper plants at home this summer which were also planted in our garden.



This month students started an exciting project; they propagated basil plants. Leaf cuttings of the plants taken by the children were placed in a small jar of water (a big thank you to the families that donated yogurt and baby food jars). In a few days enough roots grew, and the plants were ready to be potted into soil. The students enjoyed observing and caring for their new basil plants.

Students routinely care for our animals, both domestic and wild, by ensuring that they have food and fresh water. BunBun, the rabbit, enjoys being brushed and our hens love to eat the dried corn that students grind for them with the mortar and pestle. Some students have made bird feeders for the local birds by covering a toilet paper tube with peanut butter and rolling it in bird seed. The tubes are hung on trees in our garden and enjoyed by the birds as well as the squirrels.

In the chicken yard, students started learning about the external body parts of a chicken. We discussed a picture of a chicken's anatomy and then found the body parts on one of our chicken volunteers. Not all of our hens were interested in helping with this lesson. :0)



En español

In Primary, the children have been learning their numbers. Some have been introduced up to ten, and others up to one hundred. They are also learning how to greet their friends.

In Lower Elementary, there is a range of lessons happening. Many lessons are reinforced by multisensory approaches. The students are working on how to greet each other and ask how the other person is, and how to respond. They have been practicing numbers, days of the week, and colors in both Spanish and sign language. The children have been learning how to say the months and their birthdays in Spanish which aids them in solidifying their knowledge in English.

In Upper Elementary, they have been focusing more on the vowels and consonants, r's, double r's, rolling their r's, ñ, and splitting up words into syllables to aid them in spelling the words. Some of the groups discuss the different parts of speech.

In Middle, they started the year off with review. In seventh, they are practicing things like asking a friend about where they are from and then answering that question, Spanish speaking countries, and they are getting ready to talk about the weather. Eighth is working on prepositions, the regular verb *estar* and in vocabulary, they've been working on school supplies and the rooms in the school.

Grace and Courtesy

You may have heard teachers talk about Grace and Courtesy, particularly in the Primary environments. An excerpt from <http://www.infomontessori.com/practical-life/grace-and-courtesy-introduction.htm>:

"Montessori introduced Exercises in Grace and Courtesy in reaction to the young child's need for order. The child has a need to know and to absorb the social structures in order to be more at ease in his environment. Grace and Courtesy lessons give the child the vocabulary, actions, and steps required for him to build his awareness and responsiveness of those around him. This in turn gives the child a better sense of orientation in his social structure."

"Grace and Courtesy lessons are given to each child in the environment and usually in a group. This allows the child to have a clear understanding as well as a place to perfect himself with others. It is the Directress's role to give the children the correct words, and the precise movements and steps. The child then fully absorbs the how, the when, and the vocabulary used in his environment to make life more pleasant for other and for him."

"In the end, the child will have incorporated these graces and courtesies into his everyday life, which will allow for a more pleasant classroom as well as a more pleasant environment wherever the child may go."

As a staff, we practice grace and courtesy with each other, with the parents, and with the children. We do this because the best way to teach a behavior is to model the behavior you wish to see. This practice extends into the students lives at home and in the community at large. As adults, we can sometimes forget that the children are watching us, and listening to our words, to learn the appropriate way to interact with others. It is so important that all of the adults in the community model grace and courtesy towards one another so the students will see that model as the one to emulate.

Let's be a constant source of support and encouragement for one another! What we build together in positivity will be nearly impossible to tear down with negativity.
