A Message from the Head of School

Dear Children's House Community,

Welcome to the 2020/21 school year! We had a longer break from seeing each other than we are used to. Who knew when we finished the Dash for the Future on March 12 that we would not see each other again for five months? It has been such a pleasure to be back in the school with the staff and students. For those months, mostly spent on my own when I was here, the building just felt lifeless. Our community brings so much energy and joy each day, it was a real loss to not have that for so long.

We've had to make some changes in how we do things, but I am happy to report that the students all seem happy and engaged in their lessons. I know we had a few people worried about the children being willing to keep their masks on, and they have been so busy with their work and play that it seems they forget they are wearing them. Thank you to all of you for being so patient and flexible with our new routines.

As many of you know, we accept scholarships for children in Kindergarten and older. However, we didn't have any funding to help families with children in their preschool years. Over the summer, I worked with the Early Learning Coalition of Flagler and Volusia Counties and we now are able to accept the ELC funding for preschool children. I have also begun working on accessing the Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) funding. Unfortunately, I do not think we'll be able to access that funding this year. I will still work on it and get things done as quickly as I can, but there is one piece that will likely not be in place in time. If that changes, I will let everyone know right away.



We have Parent Education Nights scheduled for the upcoming month. These will take place as follows (please note a change in the Primary date):

Toddler: Tuesday, October 13 Primary: Thursday, October 22

Lower and Upper Elementary: Tuesday, October 20

Each meeting will take place virtually at 5:00. Your child's teacher will send an invitation out when we get closer to the meeting date.

Also coming up in October will be our virtual silent auction. The community organization, FOCHMS, will be creating an online auction site where you can view and bid on each item. The classes are making some lovely things, we have donations from businesses, and some teachers are making things as well. We'll send more information as we get closer to the date.






Lower Elementary with Ms. Princess and Ms. Nikki

To start off this year, Elementary is doing a bracket style tournament for songs from each Spanish speaking country. So far, Guatemala was blown out by Colombia and Cuba beat out Ecuador.



Some of the groups have been working on colors in both Spanish and American Sign Language (ASL). After practicing the days of the week, we had an extension of the lesson they had in their class and discussed the origin of days. We also spoke about Romance Languages and compared the days in Spanish with other Romance Languages. We then moved into learning the Spanish names of each month and talked about our birthdays. While counting in Spanish, the students also learned the ASL signs for each number to ten. While learning the names of family members, they learned the importance of accent marks. Without an accent mark your father is a potato! And the article changes the meaning of the word all together (which is something the students will learn later)!



The students have been practicing the Pledge of Allegiance in Spanish. We've also been learning about different prominent members of the Latinx community for Hispanic Heritage Month, as well as its origins and evolution. The focus is on recognizing the contributions and influences of the Latinx community to the United States. So far, we've talked about Cesar Chávez and Sonia Sotomayor. We're looking forward to hearing about more influential people throughout the school year.

Some of the books we have read are: <u>The Woman who Outshone the Sun</u>, <u>Hooray! It's Saturday! / ¡Vivaj ¡Es Sabadoj</u>, <u>Let's Read About Cesar Chavez</u>.

Trimary with Ms. Amy and Ms. Cory


It was a very exciting time to see the children on the first day of school. We established our daily routines with ease and our safety measures throughout the day are ensuring a happy and safe environment.

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


Upper Elementary with Mr. Keegan

What's Growing in the Gardens?

A lot has happened in the Primary garden since the start of school. We have pruned, weeded, and cleaned up nature's debris that has accumulated over the long break. Ms. Jessica has been working hard in our butterfly garden to clean it up and it is once again looking recognizable. The students have helped prepare our garden beds and the first crop of mustard greens has been planted. Betty, Bella, Quiche, Zee, and Fluffington, our hens, are big fans of mustard greens. Along with mustard greens, students have planted tomatoes. Many of the students have also made cuttings of basil and lemon balm. Our banana tree is fruiting! We have many green bananas, or 'a pack of bananas', as one of our Primary students refers to them as.

The Lower Elementary students have been very busy trimming, weeding, and beautifying their garden. Cranberry hibiscus, bee balm, and coreopsis plants were transplanted from the overgrown Primary butterfly garden. When entering the Lower Elementary garden, you may notice the beautiful new archway trellis built by Mr. Bob DeGaetano, and the lovely new steppingstones made by the students. Students have also been busy with garden lessons. By dissecting a kidney bean, they are learning the parts of a seed. To study the parts of a plant, students are planting kidney bean seeds in a cup of potting soil. Hopefully we will have many sprouting within the next week.

While there are many exciting things happening in the gardens, there is some sad news. Ms. Jessica will be leaving Children's House temporarily for personal reasons. She will be missed. We are excited to welcome Ms. Diane Farley and Ms. Rebekah Fallahi, who will be filling in until Ms. Jessica returns. Ms. Diane will help Ms. Sharon in the Primary garden and Ms. Rebekah will help her in the Lower Elementary garden.
